Patrons to have deeper pockets at Indian Trails Library

(WHEELING, IL) JUNE 9, 2010 – Indian Trails Public Library District is now offering its patrons ways to lower their electrical bills leaving them with more spending money with the help of Kill A Watt™ Meters.

“We are pleased to make these available to patrons who can now save money on their electricity bill and help their homes become more energy efficient,” said Jennifer Koch, Public Relations Manager.

There are four Kill A Watt™ Meter devices that can be checked out for one week at a time, each were donated by ComEd’s *Smart Ideas for Your Home*. The device measures how much electricity your household appliances and electronics consume.

The device can help calculate electrical expenses by the day, week, month or even an entire year. By connecting the Kill A Watt™ it will measure your appliance efficiency, therefore telling you whether you need to replace an appliance. Simply plug in the appliance and check the quality of your power when you monitor line frequency, power factor, and voltage. The tool also displays amps and watts.
