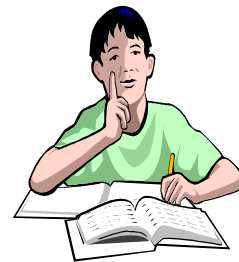


Growing up

This is the story of a family of white farmers who lived through the Rhodesian civil war. It is also an unusual and illuminating account of an African childhood.
