EXPLORING THE HISTORY OF CHIDERLEY

What is now called the Childerley Park, a 12.7 acre land on 506 McHenry Road in Wheeling, once housed a family vital to the establishment and sense of community for the area.

The family that owned this land was Dr. Francis R. Lillie and his wife, Frances Crane Lillie. The land was primarily used for cattle raising, but also included an apple and cherry orchard, school and church. The school was run by Frances' friend Elsabeth (or Elisabeth depending on the records) Port and Elsabeth's mother starting in 1917. The funding




came from Crane Company after the passing of Richard Crane, who was the father of Frances Lillie. For the school there was "preference given to widows and families of Crane Co employees," but all people in need from the community were welcome. At most they had 86 children at the school. The school included cottages for the families, a barn, an infirmary and a pool. A statue at Childerley was created in memory of Elsabeth Port and her mother. A Village with My Name offers a unique perspective on the transitions in China through the eyes of regular people who have witnessed such epochal events as the toppling of the Qing monarchy, Japan's occupation during World War II, exile of political prisoners to forced labor camps, mass death and famine during the Great Leap Forward, market reforms under Deng Xiaoping, and the dawn of the One Child Policy. Tong's story focuses on five members of his family, who each offer a specific window on a changing country. Through their stories, Tong shows us China anew, visiting former prison labor camps on the Tibetan plateau and rural outposts along the Yangtze, exploring the Shanghai of the 1930s, and touring factories across the mainland. With curiosity and sensitivity, Tong explores the moments that have shaped China and its people, offering a compelling and deeply personal take on how China became what it is today." ---Amazon description.

Oatmeal Tart Delicious Dish

Simply fill baked oatmeal tart shells with a mixture of drained canned fruit cocktail and whipped cream-enriched raspberry gelatin. Convenient to use, canned fruit cocktail provides sparkling color and delicious flavor. Keep some on hand to dress ice cream and pudding sauces, to use with other fruits in salads, to send to school in the lunch boxes.

Raspberry Cocktail Tarts

1 (1 lb. 14 oz.) can fruit cocktail

1 (3-oz.) package raspberry gelatin

34cup boiling water

- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 cup fruit cocktail syrup
- 1/2 pint whipping cream
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 2 drops almond flavoring Tart shells

Tart Shells

- 2 cups quick-cooking oatmeal 4 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
- ½ cup brown sugar, packed
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg

Drain canned fruit cocktail, reserving 1 cup syrup. Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add lemon juice and syrup. Chill until thickened. Combine cream, sugar and almond flavoring; whip until stiff. Whip gelatin mixture until fluffy; blend in whipped cream. Fold in drained fruit cocktail and chili until mixture mounds on a spoon. Heap lightly into tart shells and chill until set.

Tart shells: Combine all ingredients well. Press firmly into 8 (3½-inch) tart pans. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 8 to 10 minutes. Cool before filling.

Makes 8 servings.


